Accompanied by their wives the choir arrived after a 17-hour journey to a welcoming supper provided by the ladies section of Llandybie Male Voice Choir whose guests they were. The warmth of this reception set the tone for their brief visit and was much appreciated by the guests from across the Channel.

Mr. Kockartz in turn presented each member of Llandybie choir and their musical director, Mr. Indeg Thomas, with a Eupen pottery mug.

Supper was prepared at the Llandybie Rugby Club after which both choirs harmonised relations by joining forces. The singing of La Vergine, with Ferdinand Frings singing the lead-in solo and Janice Davies-Rees the solo part was a wonderful climax to a memorable

evening.

Another link has been forged tween Côr Meibion Llandybie and a European Choir. The internationally famous male voice choir Marienchor from Eupen, Belgium will be guests of the Llandybie choir from May 30 to June 3. Under its present conductor, Ferdinand Frings, the Marienchor of 38 woices have attained the highest grade possible for men's choral societies in Belgium. To justify this high classification the choir has to undergo an examination by an international jury every four yéars.

During the last decade, they have travelled widely over Europe by arrangements with the Belgium Ministry of Education and have performed with soloists from some of the leading opera houses in Europe including Milan, Berlin. Salzburg and Budapest. They show a special interest in the music of Franz Schubert and they often give Shubert concerts as well as making regular broadcasts in their native Belgium.
